

P.I.E.C.E.S. CHARTS

PIECES is an acronym that we use in history to cover six main themes – Political Systems, Innovation and Technology, Economic Systems, Culture, Environmental Interaction, and Social Structures. PIECES help organize a specific time period, era, or civilization. We will be using these themes throughout our study of US History. Use the chart below to understand what can be discussed under the various themes. Keep this as a blank template so that you can refer back to it all year.

DOCUMENT ANALYSIS TOOL: HIPP!

H.I.P.P. is a helpful tool for analyzing documents! It helps you break down the document so that you can better understand what it is and what's going on.

H	HISTORICAL CONTEXT	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • When was the document created? What was going on when the document was created? • Are there big events that might have motivated the author to create the document?
I	INTENDED AUDIENCE	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Who was the author's original audience? Who was meant to read, see, or hear the document? • How might that affect what is being said and how it is being said?
P	PURPOSE	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Why did the author create the document? • What's the main idea?
P	PERSPECTIVE	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • What is the author's perspective (point of view)? • What is the author's position in society? Consider emotions, political views, religion, gender, etc...
