## **DOCUMENT ANALYSIS TOOL: HIPP!**

H.I.P.P. is a helpful tool for analyzing documents! It helps you break down the document so that you can better understand what it is and what's going on.

H	HISTORICAL CONTEXT	<ul> <li>When was the document created? What was going on when the document was created?</li> <li>Are there big events that might have motivated the author to create the document?</li> </ul>
I	INTENDED AUDIENCE	<ul> <li>Who was the author's original audience?</li> <li>Who was meant to read, see, or hear the document?</li> <li>How might that affect what is being said and how it is being said?</li> </ul>
P	PURPOSE	<ul> <li>Why did the author create the document?</li> <li>What's the main idea?</li> </ul>
P	PERSPECTIVE	<ul> <li>What is the author's perspective (point of view)?</li> <li>What is the author's position in society? Consider emotions, political views, religion, gender, etc</li> </ul>
